Follow four children in different places of the world as they explore the sounds all around them. The onomatopoeia-inspired rhyming verses and animated illustrations take you on an adventure through swooshing waterfalls and rumbling volcanoes.

Extend the Learning

- **Explore animal habitats.** Visit or research the types of terrains shown in the book (online or in person). Think about a dense forest, a desert mountain, or a lake. What kind of animals live in each environment?
- What do you hear? Take a walk in your neighborhood and notice the sounds around you. It could be the swish-swoosh of tree leaves or the beep, beep of a car horn. Explore the sounds in a new place such as a grocery store or at a park.
- **Scientific inquiry.** Dive into the science of sound in the reference guide at the end of the book. Learn how sound travels through the human ear and what types of noise animals make to communicate.

The Hair Book



Infant & Toddler

This lyrical book is an appreciation of every kind of hair. Poetic rhyme and bold graphics followed by a mirror at the end, make this a fun and engaging read for children and parents alike.

Extend the Learning

- Mirror Play. Look in the mirror at the end of the book together and narrate what you both observe. "I see your hair is curly. Look how it bounces when you move. My hair is short and sways as I nod my head."
- **Explore color.** Notice how the colors complement one another on each spread. Explore and identify the different colors through a painting activity. Make it a sensory play by mixing paint with dirt, sand, salt, or other textured materials for your little one to explore with their hands.
- **Compare and contrast.** Review the concepts across each page. The author introduces the concept of opposites as you turn each page. Allow children to explore the difference between long and short, up and down, or full and empty.

Storytelling/Reading Tips

Follow Your Child's Cues

Books are more than story time. Books offer a way for children to make connections, ask questions, learn something new, and much more. Each book offers an abundance of information and illustrations that take the reader on an adventure.

Next time you pick up a book to read, **follow your child's cues**. Notice where their eyes dart on the page, what they point at, or if they lose interest in the book. Observe and discuss their interests throughout the book. For example, "I see you pointing at trees. Do you remember the last walk we took at the park? These trees look similar to the ones we saw." During the early years, make reading a joyful experience and follow your child's lead.
